Leadership in a Time of Crisis

Michelle Lemming, President & CEO

Texoma Health Foundation

Michelle Lemming has first-hand experience as the Founding Executive Director of the Health Services Recovery Council that provided real time guidance to 18 healthcare organizations most impacted by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. She will be sharing keys to successfully leading your organizations and teams during times of crisis. This session will include best practices around collaboration across government and private entities and ensuring that your organization emerges from crises with a solid financial infrastructure.



Michelle Lemming has been the President and CEO of Texoma Health Foundation since 2007, where she has overseen over \$33 million distributed in grantmaking and charitable projects since the foundation's inception, the expansion and extended focus of Reba's Ranch

House, the creation of strategic grantmaking, and their expanding endowment funds. She is one of 40 selected by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for the National Culture of Health Leaders Award. Previously, she has led local, regional and state collaboratives addressing most pressing needs, including the appointment of Executive Director for Louisiana's Health Services Recovery Council, which guided 18 healthcare organizations impacted by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

Jennifer's 17 years of service with Mercy Health began when she joined Mercy Health in 2003 as the Director of Campus Ministry and Coordinator of Service Learning for Mercy College of Ohio. Jennifer has been a champion of the ideals and commitment witnessed in the lives of the women of the founding congregations of MercyHealth. Jennifer's passion for theology, education, and healthcare motivates her work in mission and the development of a culture of presence, clinical excellence, and compliance within our facilities.



Currently, Sophia serves as Programs Director for Hospitality House of Charlotte, where a summer volunteer opportunity opened the door to a passionate career in Healthcare Hospitality. She quickly found a foothold in Operations, pulling from her diverse background and experience, and now works tirelessly to ensure that the House operates smoothly, volunteers are prepared and organized, and that everyone who steps into the House has a great experience. Sophia spent over 15 year years in the Hospitality Industry before finding her calling at HHOC, in her hometown of Charlotte, North Carolina.



Angie Stiff initially started in corporate sales and account management before joining the non-profit world in 2004 with the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and in 2014 as the Executive Director of Pinson Hospital Hospitality House in Nashville, TN, where she oversees all operations, budgets, and a full-time staff of five. In 2020, under Angie's management and with even more stringent safety protocols in place, PHHH has remained OPEN throughout the COVID-19 pandemic in Nashville with not one case of COVID-19 to date. So far this year, PHHH has housed 670 families, while the two other medical housing facilities in Nashville have been shut down due to national corporate mandates.
